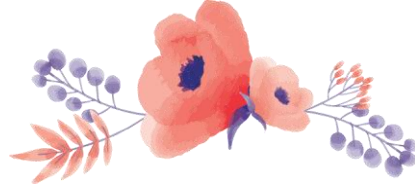

Traveling by Train

Trains are the most popular mode of transportation in Japan.

There are several types of train services:

Local Trains

Local trains stop at every station and are ideal for short-distance travel.

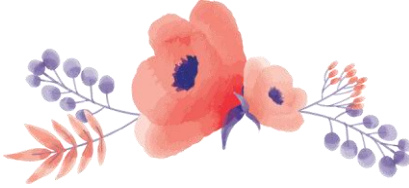
Rapid Trains

Express and Limited Express Trains

These trains travel longer distances with fewer stops and may require an additional fare.





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Shinkansen (Bullet Train)

The Shinkansen is Japan's famous high-speed railway.

It connects major cities including:

- Tokyo
- Osaka
- Kyoto
- Hiroshima
- Nagoya
- Sendai
- Fukuoka

The Shinkansen is fast, comfortable, and one of the safest rail systems in the world.

Reservations are recommended during holidays and peak travel seasons.

Using IC Cards

One of the easiest ways to travel is by using rechargeable IC cards.

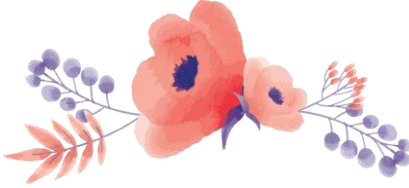
Popular cards include:

- Suica
- PASMO
- ICOCA
- TOICA
- Kitaca
- SUGOCA

These cards can be used for:

- Trains
- Subways
- Buses





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- Some taxis
- Convenience stores
- Vending machines
- Restaurants
- Lockers at train stations

Simply tap your card when entering and leaving stations.

Recharge your card at ticket machines or convenience stores.

Buying Train Tickets

If you don't have an IC card, you can purchase individual tickets from ticket machines located at every station.

Most machines offer:

- English language options
- Cash payments
- IC card top-ups

Always keep your ticket until you exit the station.

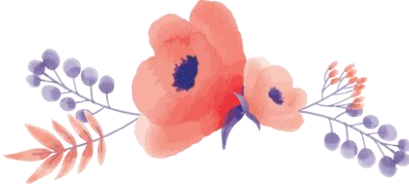
Riding the Subway

Large cities such as Tokyo, Osaka, Kyoto, and Yokohama have extensive subway networks.

Subways are fast and reliable for traveling within cities.

Station signs are displayed in both Japanese and English, making navigation much easier for international visitors.





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Traveling by Bus

Buses are commonly used in suburban and rural areas where train services may be limited.

Some buses require passengers to:

- Enter through the rear door.
- Exit through the front door.
- Tap an IC card or pay the fare before leaving.

Watch electronic displays or listen to announcements to know when your stop is approaching.

Taxis

Taxis are widely available throughout Japan.

They are:

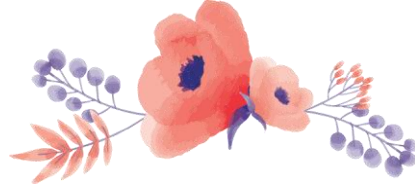
- Clean

However, taxis are generally more expensive than public transportation.

Helpful tips:

- Most taxi doors open automatically.
 - Carry your destination written in Japanese if possible.
 - Cash, credit cards, and IC cards are accepted by many taxis.
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Cycling in Japan

Bicycles are an affordable and environmentally friendly way to travel.

Many residents use bicycles for:

- Going to work
- School
- Shopping
- Short-distance travel

When riding a bicycle:

- Follow traffic signals.
- Ride carefully around pedestrians.
- Use designated bicycle parking areas.
- Lock your bicycle whenever leaving it unattended.
- Turn on your bicycle light at night.

Improper parking may result in your bicycle being removed by local authorities.

Driving in Japan

If you plan to drive in Japan, you may need:

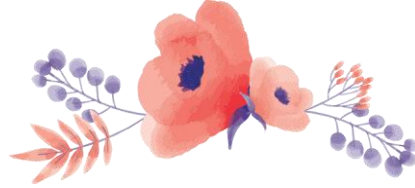
- A valid Japanese driver's license, or
- An International Driving Permit (IDP), depending on your country.

Drivers must obey all traffic laws and speed limits.

Japan drives on the **left-hand side** of the road.

Parking in cities can be expensive and limited.





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Train and Bus Etiquette

Japanese public transportation is known for its quiet and respectful atmosphere.

Please remember to:

- Queue in designated lines.
- Allow passengers to exit before boarding.
- Keep conversations quiet.
- Put your phone on silent mode.
- Avoid talking loudly on the phone.
- Offer priority seats to elderly passengers, pregnant women, and people with disabilities.
- Keep backpacks in front of you during crowded journeys.
- Do not eat or drink on local trains unless permitted.

Respecting these customs helps create a pleasant experience for everyone.

Japan's transportation network makes it easy to explore different regions.

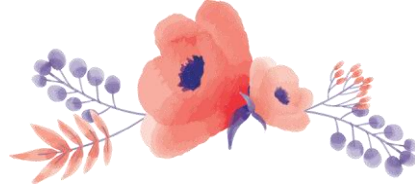
Popular destinations include:

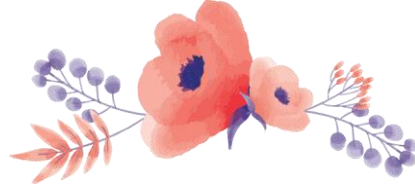

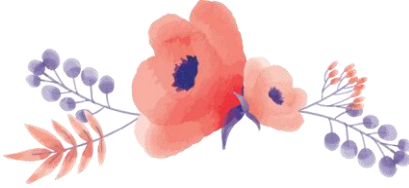
